



Lebanon Township Memorial Park would not exist without the vision, hard work and persistence of Pat Schriver, who died in 2016. There were certainly plenty of other





Recycling

Recycling News

Not only is recycling the right thing to do, it is also the law in New Jersey. Hunterdon County and Lebanon Township work together to try to make recycling convenient. Please check the recycling page of the Hunterdon County website, www.co.hunterdon.nj.us/recycling.html, for information about special county hazardous waste and electronics recycling events.



For residential recycling, materials are accepted at each of the following locations:

- 1. The township recycling depot on the third Saturday of each month between 8:30 and 11:30 AM behind the Municipal Building.
- 2. The county residential recycling program at the Transfer Station in Annandale. The hours at the transfer station are 7:00 AM to 4:30 PM Monday through Friday and 7:00 AM to 1:00 PM on Saturday.

ITEMS ACCEPTED FOR RECYCLING:

- **Aluminum cans:** Only empty beverage cans will be accepted. Other aluminum items WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Cardboard, chipboard & brown paper bags: Corrugated, chipboard (boxboard) and brown paper bags will be accepted. Cardboard should be tied or placed in another cardboard container (box). Cardboard with food or food residue WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Glass bottles and jars: Food and beverage container glass with rings and caps removed will be accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed. Cups, drinking glasses, dishes, ovenware, window glass, lead crystal, TV tubes, light bulbs, mirrors or any other type of glass product WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Hard covered books
- Junk mail & office paper: Un-shredded junk mail and office paper will be accepted. Junk mail and office paper should be tied or placed in a cardboard container (box). Shredded or bagged junk mail and office paper WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- **Newspaper:** Newspaper tied with string or twine will be accepted. Newspaper bound in tape or other materials WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Paperback books
- **Plastics bottles # 1-7:** Plastic bottles # 1-7 that originally contained liquids are accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed.
- Telephone books
- Tin and bi-metal cans: Are accepted if all food and other residue have been removed. Labels do not have to be removed.

Residential Room Air Conditioner and Dehumidifier Recycling

The Hunterdon County Health Department is providing a new recycling program to Hunterdon County residents. The county is collecting air conditioners and dehumidifiers for recycling, by appointment.

Room air conditioners and dehumidifiers contain refrigerants that are harmful to the environment, and by federal law, must be removed and recovered. The steel, other metals and selected parts of the equipment can be recycled.

Items that are accepted: Residential room air conditioners and dehumidifiers.

IONIZATION SMOKE DETECTORS - FACTS

Smoke Detectors are a common household item. One type, ionization smoke detectors, use a small radioactive source as a key component for detection of smoke particles. The radionuclide used in ionization smoke detectors is americium-241 (Am-241), which is bonded to a metallic foil and sealed within a small chamber. As long as you use the smoke detector as directed and do not open it, it poses no radiation health risk. Photoelectric detectors use a light and sensor to detect smoke and do not contain radioactive material. Many smoke detectors may use both ionization and photoelectric features to achieve maximum detection.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR:

Unfortunately not all smoke detectors are marked the same. Different indicators may be used to determine if the smoke detector contains radioactive material or not. Observe the labels and markings on the original packaging or on the back of the smoke detector and refer to the owners manual. If you see any of the following, the device does indeed contain radioactive material:



The radiation symbol in any size or color.

Any of these words: Radioactive - Ionization - Americium - Microcurie - Becquerel or Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

Any of these abbreviations: Am-241 - p.Ci - kBq or NRC.

If none of these markings occur, chances are the detector is photoelectric only and does not contain radioactive material.

Back to school means back to packing lunch...but instead of dreading it, we've decided to celebrate it with our September exhibit entitled *Lunch*



Boxes and Love Notes! Lebanon Township native, local artist and father Todd Lambrix has elevated the simple lunch box note with elaborate drawings and storylines created for his son's lunch. These unique works of art are sometimes pure entertainment, featuring fan art or science fiction storylines. However, they also frequently teach lessons on anything from biology, to how to draw, to simple life lessons with illustrated examples on how to be kind in everyday life.

After receiving overwhelmingly positive feedback from friends and colleagues, Todd has decided to publish the drawings as a book. Before the book becomes available, the public is invited to view the drawings at this exclusive exhibit at the Lebanon Township Museum.

To round out the display, we will also showcase vintage lunch boxes from the 1940s through the 1980s. These lunch boxes are both from the Museum's collection as well as the private collection of Lebanon Township resident Adriane Collett. Also included will be a variety of vintage kitchen and picnic-related toys from the Curator's personal collection. Visitors are encouraged to bring a non-perishable food item to donate when they come to see the exhibit and will have the opportunity to color a bag for Meals-On-Wheels as well.

On Thursday, September 19, we will be hosting a "Make & Play" with the theme of "Back in Time to School". Children are invited to see what a school day was like in a one-room school house by doing things like writing on slate board or with quill pens. Please check our website or email the museum for registration information and for additional events that will be scheduled to celebrate this exhibit.

In October, the Hunterdon County Quilting Guild will be displaying members' beautiful handmade quilts. Included in this exhibit will be antique sewing machines and notions from the Museum's collection.

An Opening Reception for the Quilt Show will be held on the afternoon of Saturday, October 5 and will include a "Plein Airing of the Quilts"... this new idea is a combination of an "Airing of the Quilts" (designed to air out and show off the Museum's historic quilt collection) as well as a "Plein Air" afternoon (where artists are invited to sit in the yard and sketch or paint the beautiful quilts). Other events to celebrate this

display will be added to the calendar; please check our website for more information.

In November, we will be presenting our annual display of recent works from The Musconetcong Watercolor Group, a local watercolor and drawing instruction organization led by artist Doris Ettlinger. An opening reception for this exhibit will be held on Saturday, November 9. The artwork will be on exhibit for the entire month of November along with a sampling of Ms. Ettlinger's published illustrations. She will give a free presentation at the Museum on Thursday, November 21. Please check the website for event times and information.

Historians

A Look Back at the Past...

Babe Ruth, Joe DiMaggio, Mickey Mantle ... you don't need to be a baseball fan to recognize the names of these legends. But what about Dottie Kamenshek, the 1946 AAGPBL batting champion, or Elizabeth Mahon who held the all time record for RBIs, or pitcher Helen Walulik who lived right here in Lebanon Township? These are the young women of the little known All-American Girls Professional Baseball League active from 1943-1954.

Born on May 3, 1929 to hardworking Polish immigrants, Helen grew up in Plainfield, NJ as the youngest of seven children. Voted "most athletic" in her high school yearbook, Helen was very competitive and loved sports, playing both basketball and softball. In 1947, Helen attended tryouts in Newark for the All-American Girls Professional Baseball League. Chicago Cubs owner Philip K. Wrigley founded the league as a way to keep baseball alive during World War II while the draft was pulling ball players away from the game. At the age of 18 and just after graduating high school, Helen earned a spot in the league and flew to Cuba for spring training, her first flight.

The first contract Helen signed paid her \$55 a week plus \$3 a day in meal money. Her room and board was paid for by the



team. On the road, teams stayed in nice hotels or private rooms. When she helped the Fort Wayne Daisies make it to the playoffs in 1948, she earned an additional \$600. Prior to joining the Daisies mid season, she played with the Muskegon Lassies. In her second year, she played for the Chicago Colleens (in the photo below she is wearing the Colleens team uniform). She finished off the 1949/50 season playing for the Kalamazoo Lassies, which ended up being her last year in the league.


Helen married Edmund Kiely, her high school sweetheart in 1953. Wanting to leave behind their postage stamp size lot in Plainfield, they moved to a house on West Hill Road in Lebanon Township. They had three children, two of whom graduated from Voorhees High School.

The 1954 season was the league's last. By then attendance had dropped off and businessmen who were sponsoring the teams turned to other areas of interest for their investments.

In 1986, Helen attended a reunion of the league in Fort Wayne, Indiana. The highlight of the visit was playing in a ball game. Many of the players were in their 60s at the time and Helen recalled how well they all played despite their age.

Helen passed away in 2012, but her legacy lives on at the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, NY, where uniforms, rosters, photographs and other memorabilia are on exhibit.

Mini Summer Camps at Memorial Park



Bamboo and Other Invasive Species in our Township By Doug Diehl

Some invasive species can be more aggressive than others in displacing the natural plants in a given area. Once established, invasive plants lead to less plant diversity and possibly a monoculture of just one plant that has "taken over" one area.

Common invasives in our township include Garlic mustard, Japanese knotweed and stiltgrass, mostly in open or disturbed areas. Japanese barberry has replaced many herbaceous species in more forested surroundings.

Bamboo (pictured below) has evolved into a more common problem as it forms dense growth patches that, once established, are difficult to remove. These grass plants are cold hardy and spread from its original planting by underground stems called rhizomes. Young bamboo can be removed more easily than older, more established plants.
