2009 COMMUNITY WELL-TESTING DAY

Have you had your well tested lately? Did you know that the Hunterdon County Health Department recommends that residents test their well-water annually? We know you are busy, so Lebanon Township has a convenient, low-cost solution for you! Lebanon Township Environmental & Open Space Commission sponsors a Community Well-Testing Day every year through our partnership with the South Branch Watershed Association (SBWA). And it's easy to participate!


Water sampling kits will be on sale on **Saturday, May 2** in the Municipal Building parking lot from 8:00 AM to 12:00 PM. You can drop off your completed water kit at the Municipal Building on **Monday, May 4** from 7:00 AM to 10:00 AM. A member of the Lebanon Township Environmental & Open Space Commission will be available to transport the kits down to the lab pick-up point at the SBWA. The water testing is performed by Garden State Laboratories, a New Jersey certified laboratory. All test results are reported directly and confidentially to you, the resident.

Basic kits are \$50 and include a fecal coliform and nitrate test. Additional tests are available for the following additional fees:




Bird Watchers ... We Need Your Help

First Aid Squad News

"For as much as government can do and must do, it is ultimately the faith and determination of the American people upon which this nation relies. It is the kindness to take in a stranger when the levees break, the selflessness of workers who would rather cut their hours than see a friend lose their job which sees us through our darkest hours. It is the firefighter's courage to storm a stairway filled with smoke, but also a parent's willingness to nurture a child, that finally decides our fate... What is required of us now is a new era of responsibility -- a recognition, on the part of every American, that we have duties to ourselves, our nation and the world; duties that we do not grudgingly accept but rather seize gladly, firm in the knowledge that there is nothing so satisfying to the spirit, so defining of our character, than giving our all to a difficult task." – President Barack Obama, January 20, 2009.

If you were stirred by President Obama's call to give back to the community on Inauguration Day, but didn't know where to start, the Lebanon Township First Aid Squad has a good idea.

The Lebanon Township First Aid Squad is an all-volunteer, private, non-profit organization providing free emergency medical care within our community. We charge no fee for our services. We save taxpayers thousands of dollars each year in both medical fees and operation costs. The squad survives exclusively on donations from township residents. We are not supported by tax dollars.

The LTFAS, like all non-profit organizations, has been hit by the troubled economy. The United States Bureau of Labor Statistics reports that volunteerism is at an all-time low as are donations to charitable organizations, leaving many of the organizations struggling to provide services. We need you now more than ever.

There is a place for everyone in our organization. We need volunteers to manage facilities, finances, fundraising, human resources, marketing, operations, public relations, technology, any other role you would find in a modern business — and, of course, ambulance drivers and emergency medical technicians. Experience is a plus, but we offer the opportunity for free training. Many members have used their experience with the squad to make a career change or to enhance their resume or college application.

Other benefits of joining the squad include access to the Affinity Credit Union, insurance policies through Bollinger Insurance, free services from Deborah Heart and Lung Center, discounts from Dell Computer, discounted college tuition at Farleigh Dickinson University, scholarships, discounts with Verizon Wireless and enrollment in Working Advantage, a program that provides discount tickets for movie theaters, theme parks, Broadway theaters, ski resorts, hotels, sporting events and more. If the volunteer decides to become an EMT they also have access to Blue Skies Life Insurance, free training through the EMT Training Fund, a subscription to Gold Cross Magazine, a Length of Service Award Program pension plan and the Volunteer Tuition Credit Program at Community Colleges, which allows volunteer EMTs and their eligible family members to receive up to \$600 of tuition credit for classes taken at New Jersey Community Colleges.

Of course, the best benefit of all is being able to give back to the community.

A Look back at our Heritage ... By Ralph Lomerson Lebanon Township Historian

PROPOSED BUNNVALE RESERVOIR AND WATER SHED

November 19, 1931 State's Most Gigantic Reservoir to be Built in the Gorge at Bunnvale, Lebanon Township

The future history of Lebanon Township and all the villages up the Raritan River Valley for fourteen miles was changed yesterday by a decision of the State Water Policy Commission, which is the forerunner of the largest project ever undertaken in New Jersey. More than fifty million dollars is involved in it. Starting just east of High Bridge at the (Ken Lockwood) Gorge bridge of the Branch Line of the Central Railroad in Lebanon Township, this Reservoir will eliminate Hoffmans Crossing, Califon. The only part of Califon to remain will be the Presbyterian Church and Cemetery, that being the highest ground and surrounded on three sides with water. From there, the reservoir will extend north into Vernoy and Crestmore in Hunterdon County, and Crestmore, Middle Valley, Long Valley and as far as Naughright, Washington Township, Morris County.

Proposal

In 1920, the State empowered the State Water Policy Commission to purchase land and to erect a reservoir to supply drinking water for the cities in northeast New Jersey. Several sites were proposed. Chimney Rock, in Somerset County, Ralston in Morris County, this was the first to be eliminated, and two on the South Branch of the Raritan, on a dam at Vernoy, the other on a dam at Bunnvale or Gorge site. Test borings at Vernoy showed limestone, which the engineers felt was not a good foundation to hold a dam. The test borings at the Gorge site found good solid rock.


If constructed at the Gorge site, it will necessitate the destruction of more than five hundred dwellings, churches, stores and other buildings, exclusive of small structures and farm barns, bringing the total to somewhere around 1,000. More than 1,500 persons will be required to seek residence elsewhere than in the valley. More than 180 square miles of territory will be included in the area. The Musconetcong, the upper Spruce Run, Black River and a portion of the Rockaway Creek will be diverted to this reservoir.

To Tunnel Mountain

A tunnel will pierce Schooley's Mountain from a point near Hackettstown to another near Naughright to convey Musconetcong water, while a shorter spur under the hills will bring Black River water from a point near Chester Furnace. No method of conveying Spruce Run water has been disclosed as yet. The Tidewater pipe line, which crosses the South Branch Raritan River at Vernoy, will be removed to below the dam. The Branch line of the Central Railroad will be relayed to between High Bridge and Glen Gardner, to follow the west side of the Reservoir. Two new towns will be rebuilt, Califon and Long Valley. Their new locations are currently unknown.

As you know, this was never constructed. The Governor A. Harry Moore was not in favor of the project. At first, the residents of the valley opposed it, however, as time went on, many were in favor. In the mid to late 1930's the project was dropped.

As a teenager growing up in Lebanon Township, I remember people talking about it.



The Township Recycling Depot is held on the **third Saturday of each month** from 8:30 AM to 11:30 AM behind the First Aid Squad and Municipal Buildings, 530 West Hill Road. Containers (aluminum, bi-metal, glass, and #1 and #2 plastics) can be commingled. Cardboard, newspapers and junk mail/magazines should be bundled and tied separately. Household batteries can also be dropped off. Please observe the rules - we're getting a lot of plastic that is not #1 or #2.

Household Hazardous Waste Cleanup Day

The Hunterdon County Utilities Authority (HCUA) will hold a hazardous waste cleanup day on **Saturday, March 14** from 9:00 AM - 1:00 PM, rain or shine, at the Hunterdon County Complex, 314 Route 12 East, Flemington. They will accept up to 10 gallons or 80 lbs. of the following: latex paint, oil based paint, paint thinner, asbestos pipe wrap, varnish/stains, insecticides, pesticides, gasoline, herbicides, pool chemicals, aerosol cans, kerosene, gas/oil mix, photographic chemicals, battery acid, drain cleaner, mercury, fuel oil/sludge, diesel fuel, fluorescent tubes, fire extinguishers, and thermostats. Consolidate latex paints and oil based paints, keeping them type separated, to make full cans. Wrap fluorescent tubes in newspaper or put back in original sleeve. They will accept with no quantity limit: used motor oil, anti-freeze, and automotive

and household batteries. They will not accept empty containers, radioactive materials, explosives, air conditioners, pentachlorophenol, PCBs, silvex, solid waste, tires, electronics, propane tanks or helium tanks.


LEBANON TOWNSHIP GARDEN OF REMEMBRANCE




