



Improvements Made During Recent Park Work Days

Squad Support Services

The organization which supports the First Aid Squad, has changed its name from the First Aid Squad Service Association to Support Services. "We felt that the name change was needed to reflect the evolution of the type of services that the squad needed," said Sandra Singer Rauschenberger-Nell, Support Services President. "This isn't your parent's squad. We wanted to break away from the stereotype of banquets and pancake breakfasts. In today's squad, support services include the back office and professional services for the squad."

In the past, service associations and auxiliaries were started by the wives of members of squads to provide food and drinks to members during or after calls. Many of these support groups developed into running banquets and pancake breakfasts to raise money for the main organization. While the traditional role of these support groups is still a valued part of squad life, increased regulations and business demands on squads have resulted in an expanded role of these support groups. Plus, today the squad has just as many female members as male members.

Today, squads need volunteers to manage facilities, finances, fundraising, human resources, marketing, operations, public relations, technology and any other role you would find in a modern business. To fill the gap, many of the squad's Emergency Medical Technicians have had to pull double duty. "I'm day time crew chief, which means I run calls from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. five days a week, plus I'm the public relations officer and the Support Services President. Sometimes, it gets to be a little much," said Ms. Rauschenberger. "We really need people who are willing to donate their time to support the business operations of the squad. The idea that we are just looking for EMTs and drivers is just not true." She added, "I'm really looking forward to being able to hand over the reigns as Support Services President to a savvy business manager who is willing to leverage their time and skills to take business operations to the next level."

Experience is a plus, but the squad is willing to train support services volunteers. Whether you are interested in a career in the health field or not, volunteering for a squad is a good way to get on the job training. Ms. Rauschenberger is a good example of using her experience on the squad to change her career. She started out doing public relations for the squad with little experience. She landed her last two consulting jobs because she was able to include five years of public relations experience on her resume.

Other benefits of joining the squad include access to the Affinity Credit Union, insurance policies through Bollinger Insurance, free services from Deborah Heart and Lung Center, discounts from Dell Computer, discounted college tuition at Farleigh Dickinson University, scholarships, discounts with Verizon Wireless and enrollment in Working Advantage, a program that provides discount tickets for movie theaters, theme parks,

Broadway theater, ski resorts, hotels, sporting events and more. If the volunteer decides to become an EMT they also have access to Blue Skies Life Insurance, free training through the EMT Training Fund, a subscription to Gold Cross Magazine, a Length of Service Award Program pension plan and the Volunteer Tuition Credit Program at Community Colleges, which allows volunteer EMTs and their eligible family members to receive up to \$600 of tuition credit for classes taken at New Jersey Community Colleges. "Of course the best benefit of all is being able to give back to the community," said Ms. Rauschenberger.

Community Partners Program

The Lebanon Township First Aid Squad has started a new Community Partners program. 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

Summer Fire Safety

Protect yourself, your family and your home from the potential threat of fire during or after a summer storm.

Each year, Americans look forward to summer vacations, camping, family reunions, picnics, and the Fourth of July. Summertime, however, also brings fires and injuries due to fireworks and outdoor grills. Annually, more than 8,000 Americans are injured by fireworks and grill fires. More than half these injuries occur during the first week of July.

USFA's National Fire Data Center estimates that outside cooking grills cause more than 6,000 fires, over 5 fatalities, more than 170 injuries, and \$35 million in property loss each year. Gas grills alone cause over 2,700 fires, 80 injuries, and \$11 million dollars in damage. Most of the gas grill fires and explosions are caused by gas leaks, blocked tubes, and overfilled propane tanks.

In addition to outdoor cooking, improper use of fireworks causes more than 6,000 fires and more than \$8 million in damage. Families also enjoy camping in the summer. It is important to follow the park's rules for the use and extinguishing of campfires. Summertime should be a time for fun and making happy memories. Knowing a few fire safety tips and following instructions will help everyone have a safe summer.

Fireworks Safety

The best way to enjoy fireworks is to visit public fireworks displays put on by professionals who know how to safely handle fireworks. Fireworks are illegal in our area.

Barbecue Safety

Before using a grill, check the connection between the propane tank and the fuel line. Make sure the venturi tubes, where the air and gas mix, are not blocked. Do not overfill the propane tank. Do not wear loose clothing while cooking at a barbecue. Be careful when using lighter fluid. Do not add fluid to an already lit fire because the flames can flashback up into the container and explode. Keep all matches and lighters away from children. Teach your children to report any loose matches or lighters to an adult immediately. Supervise children around outdoor grills. Dispose of hot coals properly, douse them with plenty of water, and stir them to ensure that the fire is out. Never place them in plastic, paper or wooden containers. Never grill/barbecue in enclosed areas, as carbon monoxide could be produced. Make sure everyone knows to Stop, Drop and Roll in case a piece of

clothing does catch fire. Call 911 or your local emergency number if a burn warrants serious medical attention.

Campfire Safety

Make sure you apply for a permit before having a campfire. Build campfires where they will not spread, away from dry grass and leaves. Keep campfires small, and don't let them get out of hand. Keep plenty of water and a shovel around to douse the fire when you're done. Stir it and douse it again with water. Never leave campfires unattended.

Follow these Safety tips and we will all have a great summer.

Recycling

Township Depot Continues

The Township Recycling Depot is held on the third Saturday of each month from 8:30 AM to 11:30 AM behind the First Aid Squad and Municipal Buildings, 530 West Hill Road. Containers (aluminum, bi-metal, glass, and #1 and #2 plastics) can be commingled. Cardboard, newspapers and junk mail/ magazines should be bundled and tied separately. Household batteries can also be dropped off. Please observe the rules we're getting a lot of plastic that is not #1 or #2.

Household Hazardous Waste Cleanup Day

The Hunterdon County Utilities Authority (HCUA) will hold a hazardous waste cleanup day on Saturday, July 12 from 9:00 AM - 1:00 PM (rain or shine) at the Hunterdon County Complex, Route 12, Flemington. They will accept up to 10 gallons or 80 lbs. of the following: latex paint, oil based paint, paint thinner, asbestos pipe wrap, varnish/stains, insecticides, pesticides, gasoline, herbicides, pool chemicals, aerosol cans, kerosene, gas/oil mix, photographic chemicals, battery acid, drain cleaner, mercury, fuel oil/sludge, diesel fuel, fluorescent tubes, fire extinguishers, thermostats and acetylene cylinders. Consolidate latex paints and oil based paints, keeping them type separated, to make full cans. Wrap fluorescent tubes in newspaper or put back in original sleeve. They will accept with no quantity limit: used motor oil, anti-freeze, and automotive and household batteries. They will not accept empty containers, materials, explosives, air conditioners, pentachlorophenol, PCBs, silvex, solid waste, tires, electronics, propane tanks and helium tanks.

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

Historians

A Look back at our Heritage ... By Ralph Lomerson Lebanon Township Historian

Nachbar (Neighbour) A Pioneer family of German Valley

November 25th, three hundred and ten years ago, was born a man whose personality had much to do with the history of Lebanon Township.

The first settlers came into the valley of the Raritan, north of High Bridge, about 1705, with some locating near Bunnvale and others at German Valley, now Long Valley. Among those who came up from the Delaware after crossing the ocean from Saxony, were Leonard Nachbar and his future wife, Maria Magarris. They were the great grandparents of David Neighbour, whose store stood on the Neighbour farm, along present day Route 513, about one half of a mile west of Califon Road or County Road 512. This store building, constructed of stone, still stands as a residence today.

Leonard Nachbar, anglicized Neighbour, the first of the Neighbours coming to this section of New Jersey, is buried in the old cemetery at Long Valley. He died August 26, 1766, aged sixty eight years. His wife died November 17, 1770, aged seventy two years. David Neighbour, who was one of the founders of the Lower Valley Presbyterian Church, was born November 25, 1797, on the farm later occupied by his grandson, Stewart Neighbour, located just this side of Long Valley.

David Neighbour had experience in the store business with Welsh and Dellicker of Schooley's Mountain from 1808 to 1823. At that time he came to Lower Valley and built the stone storehouse which is still standing. He closed the store business in 1852, but remained on the farm until 1859. He then lived in New York City from 1859 until 1867, when he returned to the homestead for the remainder of his life.

The early settlers had intended to locate on the banks of the Hudson River, but adverse winds drove their ships into the Delaware, and they came north until they found this valley. From Philadelphia they went up to New Hope. Crossing the river there, they took the Old York Road. Precisely where this band struck the mountainous region is not known, but their vision was charmed with the tempting nature of the soil and the streams. They found this whole section astir with pioneers who were prospecting and settling. Abandoning their original intention, they resolved to establish themselves on the good land of Lebanon Township.

The Neighbours held many positions in the township. Leonard was Justice of the Peace, Commissioner of Appeal, Overseer of the Highway and Township Committeeman. David was a Township Committeeman and Justice of the Peace.




