

### Fire Department

#### **Summer Fire Safety**

Each year, Americans look forward to summer vacations, camping, family reunions, picnics, and the Fourth of July. Summertime, however, also brings fires and injuries due to fireworks and outdoor grills. Annually, more than 8,000 Americans are injured by fireworks and grill fires. More than half these injuries occur during the first week of July.

The U.S. Fire Administration estimates that outside cooking grills cause more than 6,000 fires, over 5 fatalities, more than 170 injuries, and \$35 million in property loss each year. Gas grills alone cause over 2,700 fires, 80 injuries, and \$11 million dollars in damage. Most of the gas grill fires and explosions are caused by gas leaks, blocked tubes, and overfilled propane tanks. Position your grill at least two feet away from wood siding, deck railings, awnings, and low trees branches. Before using a grill, check the connection between the propane tank and the fuel line. Make sure the venturi tubes, where the air and gas mix, are not blocked. Do not overfill the tank. Do not wear loose clothing while cooking at a barbecue. Be careful when using lighter fluid. Do not add fluid to an already lit fire because the flames can flashback up into the container and explode. Keep all matches and lighters away from children. Teach your children to report any loose matches or lighters to an adult immediately. Supervise children around outdoor grills. Dispose of hot coals properly by dousing them with plenty of water and stirring to ensure that the fire is out. Never place them in plastic, paper or wooden containers. Never grill or barbecue in enclosed areas, as carbon monoxide could be produced. Keep a fire extinguisher outside to quickly douse a fire should it get out of hand. Make sure everyone knows to "Stop, Drop and Roll" in case a piece of clothing does catch fire. Call 911 or your local emergency number if a burn warrants medical attention.

Improper use of fireworks causes more than 6,000 fires and more than \$8 million in damage. The best way to enjoy fireworks is to visit public fireworks displays put on by professionals who know how to safely handle fireworks. Fireworks are illegal in our area.

Make sure you apply for a permit before building a campfire on your property. Build campfires where they will not spread, away from dry grass and leaves. Keep them small and don't let them get out of hand. Never place a pit closer than 10 feet to anything flammable, including your house and overhead tree branches. Keep plenty of water and a shovel around to douse the fire when you're done. Stir it and douse it again with water. Never leave campfires & fire pits unattended. If you build a campfire while camping at a public or private campground, be sure to follow the park's campfire rules.

Summertime should be a time for fun and making happy memories. Knowing a few fire safety tips and following instructions will help everyone have a safe summer.

### First Aid Squad

#### **Squad News**

First and foremost, the members of the Lebanon Township First Aid Squad (LTFAS) would like to say "Thank You" to all the friends and residents in the community for their support during our annual fund drive.

The LTFAS relies solely on donations and fund drives during the year. We do not receive any tax money from the township, county or state. The Squad pays to keep our emergency vehicles in working order and restock the ambulances with medical equipment and supplies. We also pay our own monthly utility expenses at the Squad building. Thankfully, we were able to pay off the mortgage on the Squad building a few years ago.

In the very near future, our expenses may also include the cost of certification and re-certification training.

On April 23, 2009, the New Jersey State First Aid Council received word, and informed volunteer squads around the state, that **4 million dollars was removed from the Emergency Medical Technician Training Fund via an executive order from the Governor.** The fund was originally set up by the state without tax monies, so Volunteer EMT's would have funding for EMT certification and re-certification training every 3 years. These are state mandated requirements. Currently, fifty cents from each moving traffic violation fine received by the state is put into the EMT Training Fund.

In 2007, volunteer squads accumulated a total of 5,643,886 ambulance miles and 2,611,898 volunteer member hours. Using the corporate model reimbursement for mileage @ \$0.585 per mile, and an entry level salary of \$12.50 per hour for an EMT, these squads would have cost the state about 35 million dollars. That total does not include the costs of restocking supplies, repairs and replacements of ambulances.

We all know there are economic problems in NJ, but to take the dedicated money from the EMT Training Fund and redirect it to the state's general fund will not be beneficial to the communities around the state or to Lebanon Township. This will add an additional burden to already stretched budgets with the increase of taxes.

If the State of New Jersey continues to strip resources from the Volunteer Squads, we will have to start looking elsewhere to make up the gaps in our own budgets. Several options are being considered by squads in the state, including the option of billing patients for some part of the services rendered, in order for Volunteer squads to keep ambulances stocked and members trained.

If any member of the community has questions or comments, as always, feel free to contact our squad with your concerns. By the time you receive this newsletter, the Corzine plan may or may not still be in effect. We urge everyone to contact your legislative representatives with your concerns. #### What You Need to Know About Swine Flu

Swine Influenza (swine flu, pig flu) is a respiratory disease of pigs caused by type A influenza viruses. Outbreaks of swine flu happen regularly in pigs. People do not normally get swine flu, but human infections can and do happen. Swine influenza viruses don't spread through food. Most commonly, human cases of swine flu occur in people who are around pigs, but it is also possible for swine flu viruses to spread from person to person. The current outbreak is caused by the H1N1 Influenza A virus. Human-to-human transmission is ongoing in the current outbreak.

Signs and symptoms are similar to regular seasonal human flu and include: fever, cough, sore throat, body aches, headache, chills, and fatigue. Some people also have diarrhea and vomiting. H1N1 influenza A is not only missing an amino acid to make it more virulent, it is also so similar to the 1957 version of the flu, that older people may have immunity to it.

H1N1 influenza A can be treated with the drugs Tamiflu or Relenza. The federal government has stockpiled enough of the drugs to treat 50 million people, and many states have additional stocks. As a precaution, the CDC has shipped a quarter of that supply to the states to keep on hand just in case the virus starts spreading more than it has so far.

Protecting yourself from getting Swine Flu just takes a little common sense. You should always cough or sneeze into your sleeve, not your hand. If you do not have sleeves, cover your nose and mouth with a tissue. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it. Flu viruses can live on surfaces for hours. Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. Alcohol-based hand cleaners are also effective. Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs spread that way. It is also a good idea to avoid crowded places during any outbreak.

It is a good idea to make all these suggestions routine. By adopting these habits, you can protect yourself from many illnesses, including the common cold.

**Breaking news: Bunnvale Library goes wireless (WiFi)!** Effective immediately, patrons are welcome to bring their own laptops and log on to the internet via our new WiFi interface. Please check with the library clerks for Bunnvale's WiFi password.

We will also be implementing a new sign-in policy for patrons age 17 and older who use the public computers. Those patrons must present a current Hunterdon County library card or photo ID to gain internet access. An Internet Policy and Agreement is currently in use within the county library system, which includes member and branch libraries, and is available for review in hard copy at the libraries and also on the main library website (www.hclibrary.us).

The annual Summer Reading Programs will take place June through August. The theme for the children's program is *Be Creative! Express Yourself at Your Library*; for adults, it is *Master the Art of Reading*. We are also planning Summer Story Time and crafts for preschool and school-age children. #### A Bit of History of the Lebanon Township Board of Education

In the year 1906, Lebanon Township had 14 schools.

At a school meeting held at Woodglen last Saturday, May 21, 1906 for Lebanon Township, \$530 was voted to repair the school building at Glen Gardner and \$500 for current expenses. The Board of Education held a meeting subsequently and elected teachers for the next school year, 1907 as follows:

Lebanon Township is up against the proposition of making a change in the present school system. There are many small schools in the township which are run at a great expense to the taxpayers and it is proposed to discontinue some of them and transport the pupils to other schools. Some of the school buildings in the township are unfit for use and will have to be succeeded by new buildings. It is proposed to erect a new High School building in Glen Gardner and abandon the Rocky Run, Spruce Run and Mt. Airy schools and the Mondalia and Beacon academies. The pupils from these schools are to be transported to the new building. Something must be done, and a proposition will soon be submitted to the taxpayers by the Board of Education.

In 1906 Glen Gardner was part of Lebanon Township.

#### A Reminder from Jersey Central Power & Light ... Posting Signs & Banners on Utility Poles

New Jersey State Statue 27:5-9, prohibits the placing of signs (political or otherwise) on public utility poles. The statue states, "A sign may not be painted, drawn, erected or maintained upon trees, rocks, other natural features or public utility poles." Penalties range from \$50 to \$500 for each offense. Each day of the violation may be deemed to be a separate offense.

Aside from being illegal, these signs pose a safety hazard to utility workers. Not only do the signs often prevent them from being able to physically climb the pole, but nails, staples, etc. could cause injury to utility workers or could jeopardize the integrity of safety equipment (gloves) that may unknowingly be punctured by these staples and nails.

Permission to attach to utility poles must be obtained before installing the following pole attachments: holiday lighting and decorations, horizontal banners, and vertical banners/flags. Any attachments to utility poles must be pre-approved by both Jersey Central Power & Light and the local telephone company prior to installation. Attachments made without permission are illegal and the parties attached are responsible for any damage to property or persons.
