

Recycling

Recycling News

Not only is recycling the right thing to do, it is also the law in New Jersey. Hunterdon County and Lebanon Township work together to try to make recycling convenient. Please check the recycling page of the Hunterdon County website, www.co.hunterdon.nj.us/recycling.htm, for information about special county hazardous waste and electronics recycling events. Lebanon Township generally has an electronics recycling event the second Saturday in May.

For residential recycling, materials are accepted at each of the following locations:

- 1. The township recycling depots on the third Saturday of each month between 8:30 and 11:30 AM behind the Municipal Building.
- 2. The county residential recycling program at the Transfer Station in Annandale. The hours at the transfer station are 7:00 AM to 4:30 PM Monday through Friday and 7:00 AM to 1:00 PM on Saturday.



ITEMS ACCEPTED FOR RECYCLING:

- **Aluminum cans**: Only empty beverage cans will be accepted. Other aluminum items WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Cardboard, chipboard & brown paper bags: Corrugated, chipboard (boxboard) and brown paper bags will be accepted. Cardboard should be tied or placed in another cardboard container (box). Cardboard with food or food residue WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Glass bottles and jars: Food and beverage container glass with rings and caps removed will be accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed. Cups, drinking glasses, dishes, ovenware, window glass, lead crystal TV tubes, light bulbs, mirrors or any other type of glass product WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Hard covered books
- **Junk mail & office paper**: Un-shredded junk mail and office paper will be accepted. Junk mail and office paper should be tied or placed in a cardboard container (box). Shredded or bagged junk mail and office paper WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- **Newspaper**: Newspaper tied with string or twine will be accepted. Newspaper bound in tape or other materials WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Paperback books
- **Plastics bottles # 1-7:** Plastic bottles # 1-7 that originally contained liquids are accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed.
- Telephone books
- **Tin and bi-metal cans:** Are accepted if all food and other residue has been removed. Labels do not have to be removed.
- Dry cell batteries

VERNAL POOLS

Large puddles or small shallow ponds of water may be found in wooded areas on private property as well as open space preserves and parks. These "vernal pools" occur in low-lying swales or in regions of slow drainage. These temporary shallow water bodies may also originate from a temporary high water table or from artesian springs. They can be man-made, occurring along roadsides, ditches or other drainage systems.

From Spring to Summer

Vernal pools will be more numerous after a snowy winter or a wet early spring. As spring progresses to summer, these pools will evaporate, often becoming a muddy forest floor. The pools are essential for the breeding and developmental stage of certain amphibians. Later, the wetland forest floor serves as an area for feeding on mostly small insects and other small invertebrates. The forest floor litter also provides shelter from predators and weather variables for these amphibians.

Vernal pools are necessary for much of our amphibian species, since the beginning of their life cycle depends on their existence. Adult frogs and certain salamanders will migrate to these pools to deposit and fertilize their eggs. Since the water is isolated and temporary, there are no fish to act as predators for the developing frog tadpoles or larvae of salamanders. In addition, these young developing stages will feed on algae, small animals such as mosquito larvae, and plankton that flourish in these nutrient waters. This microscopic food source is important energy as the tadpoles mature and change into adults.

Amphibians such as the Wood Frog and Eastern Tiger Salamander must migrate to these pools to reproduce for the survival of their species during early spring. They may be subject to being run over when crossing roads, to obstructions, or to predators. Marbled Salamanders will migrate in the fall or early winter to low lying areas to lay their eggs in mud and wet leaves. In spring, these areas usually pool with melted winter ice and snow. Migration is a vulnerable necessity to most amphibians.

The most vocal among early spring amphibians is the Spring Peeper. This small frog may migrate to small ponds or streams to breed in March and April. In wooded areas they will also use vernal pools to lay their eggs near shallow water or water's edge, allowing tadpoles to feed and develop. You can hear the males making their distinctive high pitch call to attract females, although we rarely see them except when they migrate to wetland areas.

You may have vernal pools on your property or you may notice them as you walk the open space areas in our beautiful rural township. Treat them kindly, since they are essential to the life cycle of small animals and amphibians.

Vernal Pools During the Summer

Most soils are aerobic or contain oxygen. Oxygen in soils is important for plant roots to respire by absorbing oxygen and carbohydrates and by releasing carbon dioxide. Vernal pools will many times feature exposed areas of dark hydric soil in the summer. A hydric soil is formed under conditions of water saturation or ponding long enough to develop oxygen poor or anaerobic conditions that discourage vegetation growth.

As you walk in our woodlands this summer, you may notice areas that were once vernal pools. Wetland vegetation will attempt to grow around these oxygen poor, muddy areas where the soil is slightly less saturated. During hot, dry summer days, reptiles, amphibians, land snails, and other animals may use these muddy areas as resting places from hot, dry conditions. This "summer hibernation" is called aestivation. Once again, treat them kindly, since vernal pools are important even during our summer.



Six-Year-Old Author Publishes Her First Book

Six-year-old Finnoula Louise steps onto the book publishing stage, taking her place among a select group of child authors published before age 18. Like many authors, Finnoula's writing stems from her love of storytelling, her clever imagination and her lifelong fondness for books. But the secret of her success as a child author and illustrator is her ability to focus on a task for long periods. As a kindergarten student, Finnoula is just learning to read and write, so her first title is a picture book with minimal, but poignant, text.

Published by Little Valley Books[®], Finnoula's first book, "Aminals" Animals, is now available in New Jersey bookstores and online at major booksellers, including Barnes & Noble and Amazon.com. 
