

Lebanon Township School District Says a Fond Farewell

Lebanon Township School District's Superintendent, Mrs. Judith Burd, will retire this June after having served 39 years in the district.

Mrs. Burd began teaching Basic Skills at Valley View Elementary in 1974. She taught 3rd grade from 1975 to 1979. She then became a special education teacher, and taught a resource room class for the perceptually impaired from 1979 to 1994. She also taught Latin to 6th graders. From 1994 to 1996, Mrs. Burd taught 7th grade language arts. She became principal of Woodglen Middle School in 1996, and served in that position until 2003. Mrs. Burd became superintendent of Lebanon Township School District in 2003.

We are greatly indebted to Mrs. Burd for her dedication and wonderful contributions to the Lebanon Township School District during her extensive years of service. She will be greatly missed.

the foundation and used to fund scholarships. Additional money from the foundation would be used for the annual 5K run expenses and the remainder would be awarded to the Califon EMS squad.


News from the North Hunterdon-Voorhees Regional High School District

- The Board of Education has approved a budget for the 2012 -2013 school year that will <u>not</u> raise the local tax levy. This budget has received final approval from the Executive County Superintendent. As the Board of Education voted to move school elections to coincide with the November general election, a public vote on the budget is not required unless the local tax levy increases by more than 2%.  - * The list of open seats on the North Hunterdon-Voorhees Board of Education for next year is also listed on this webpage. Board member elections will be included on the ballot on November 6, 2012. Nominating petitions from those interested in being a Board member must be submitted to the Hunterdon County Clerk's Office by 4:00 PM on June 5, 2012.
- As part of its new accountability system developed through flexibility from No Child Left Behind, the New Jersey Department of Education has created a list of schools that are lowest performing, in need of improvement, and highest performing across the state. Both North Hunterdon and Voorhees High Schools are the only schools in Hunterdon County to be included on the list of the



Highest Performing schools in the state. This is a great recognition for the high school district. The full list of schools can be found at http://www.state.nj.us/education/ news/2012/0411rac.htm.

- The Voorhees High School Wrestling Team once again sponsored "Pinning 4 a Purpose", which gives wrestlers the opportunity to give back to a charitable organization in the local community. Wrestlers obtain pledges for each pin they achieve throughout the season and then at the end of the season, the total pledge count multiplied by number of pins is donated. This year, the wrestlers raised \$6,100 for the Special Olympics of Hunterdon County. In the two years of this fundraising program, the Voorhees Wrestling Team has donated \$10,700 to the Special Olympics.
- In the 2012 National Merit Scholarship Competition, one senior from Voorhees High School was named as a Finalist and 4 seniors were named as Commended Students in the competition. Students were chosen based on their scores from the 2010 Preliminary SAT (PSAT) or National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test exam. Commended Students place among the top 5% of the 1.5 million students who entered the competition by taking either exam. Finalists have the opportunity to receive a \$2,500 scholarship.
 - * Congratulations to Jake Szymczak of Lebanon Township, who was named a Commended Student!
- The high school district has partnered with UMB CardPartner to launch a VISA[®] Platinum Rewards Credit Card Program. There are two card designs, one representing each high school. Once a person applies for and activates his/her North Hunterdon-Voorhees Regional High School District VISA[®], the district will receive \$50 as well as a percent from all purchases charged to the card. 
Park Committee Considers Building a Dog Park



Sustainable Jersey

Lebanon Township has always been an advocate of land, natural resource, and wildlife preservation, as well as outdoor education and recycling programs, but now is its chance to prove just how sustainable it can be. On April 4, a resolution was passed by the township committee to register Lebanon Township for the Sustainable Jersey Municipal Certification Program. Sustainable Jersey is a certification program for municipalities in New Jersey that want to go green, save money, and take steps to sustain their quality of life over the long term. It provides tools, training and financial incentives to support and reward communities as they pursue sustainability programs. The New Jersey State League of Municipalities, the College of New Jersey, the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection, and the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities all share the responsibility for creating and managing the Sustainable Jersey Program.

Approximately 60% of the towns in New Jersey are registered or certified for the program, including neighboring towns such as Califon, Hampton, Mansfield, Hackettstown, High Bridge, and Washington. Residents increasingly want to live in towns that are doing their part for the environment. The Sustainable Jersey actions cover a wide range of topic areas focusing on people, prosperity and the planet. Lebanon Township has the opportunity to begin its journey towards sustainability by setting a precedent for its residents. It can do this by establishing various ordinances, programs and plans, and policies and procedures as set forth by the Sustainable Jersey program, as well as performing energy efficient retrofits and renovations of facilities. There is even talk of solar installations and a community garden. By becoming a Sustainable Jersey certified town, our municipality will become aligned with our community's values while saving our resources as well as nature's.

DEP Offers Tips on Reducing Conflicts and Encounters with Bears During Active Spring Period



most active period of the year in search of food and mates, which makes encounters with humans in populated areas more likely. To reduce the risk of potential encounters, New Jersey residents, particularly those living in "bear country" in northwestern New Jersey, are advised to take a few simple precautions. You can reduce the risk of interactions with bears by taking a few common sense steps," said Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) Commissioner Bob Martin. "Most important, do not feed bears, either intentionally or unintentionally. Bears that learn to associate food with people, and their homes and living areas, can turn into nuisance bears that regularly forage in neighborhoods looking for easy sources of food. The result is sometimes troubling bear-human encounters."

It is illegal to intentionally feed black bears in New Jersey and punishable by a fine of up to \$1,000 per offense. But the more common problem is unintentional bear feeding by homeowners who unknowingly make household trash, pet foods and other food sources easily available for bears to find and eat.

"Securing your trash and taking care to eliminate obvious sources of food for bears, such as bird feeders or food residues left in outdoor barbecue grills, is the best method to keep bears from being attracted to your home or property," said David Chanda, director of the State Division of Fish and Wildlife.

The bear population in New Jersey has grown in recent years with bears sighted in all 21 counties, and bear-human encounters are occurring more frequently in places outside of traditional bear country, including more heavily populated suburban areas of the state.

To deal with that issue, a New Jersey Comprehensive Black Bear Management Policy was developed by the state's Fish and Game Council and approved by Commissioner Martin. That policy emphasizes managing black bears through research and monitoring, non-lethal and lethal control of problem bears, public education on co-existing with bears, and includes an annual controlled hunt.

DEP wildlife experts stress that a black bear passing through a residential area should not be considered a problem, as long as it is behaving normally and not posing a threat. They offer the following tips to minimize conflicts with bears this spring:

- Use certified bear-resistant garbage containers if possible. Otherwise, store all garbage in containers with tight-fitting lids and place them along the inside walls of your garage, or in the basement, a sturdy shed or other secure area.
- Wash garbage containers frequently with a disinfectant solution to remove odors. Put out garbage on collection day, not the night before.
- Avoid feeding birds when bears are active. If you choose to feed birds, do so during daylight hours only and bring feeders indoors at night. Suspend birdfeeders from a freehanging wire, making sure they are at least 10 feet off the ground. Clean up spilled seeds and shells daily.

- Immediately remove all uneaten food and food bowls used by pets fed outdoors.
- Clean outdoor grills and utensils to remove food and grease residue to minimize odors. Store grills securely.
- Do not place meat or any sweet foods in compost piles.
- Remove fruit or nuts that fall from trees in your yard.
- Properly installed electric fencing is an effective way of protecting crops, beehives and livestock.
- If you encounter a bear remain calm and do not run. Make sure the bear has an escape route. Avoid direct eye contact, back up slowly and speak with a low, assertive voice.

Report bear damage, nuisance behavior or aggressive bears to the Wildlife Control Unit of the DEP's Division of Fish and Wildlife at (908) 735-8793. During evenings and weekends, residents should call their local police department or the DEP Hotline at (877) WARN-DEP.

Historians

A Brief History of the Old Swack Church by Nina Savoia, Historian

The ruin of a stone structure on Anthony Road is locally known as the Old Swack Church. Other names used for this structure include the Mount Tamarack Church, because of the tamarack trees that populated the woods in the 1800's, and the Mount Bethel Church. The correct name of the church that once stood there is the Mount Bethel Evangelical Lutheran Church.

Its founder and first pastor was Lambert Swackhammer, born in 1805 near Middle Valley, NJ. As a young man, Mr. Swackhammer lived near Cooperstown, NY, due to his parents move, and entered the seminary at Hartwick. After studying there for a few years he became a school teacher. After his marriage, he returned to Hartwick Seminary and graduated in 1831. A few days later, he was licensed to preach by the Evangelical Lutheran Ministerium of New York.

There was a period of much strife over doctrinal differences in Lutherans in New York which led Swackhammer to withdraw from the Ministerium in 1833. In 1836, he introduced a resolution sharply condemning slavery, but the majority of the delegates felt that this was more political than doctrinal and did not concern the church. He was rebuffed and he and three of his associates withdrew from Hartwick Synod.

In September 1843, he returned to New Jersey but was refused as a replacement to Reverend Pohlman at German Town (now Long Valley) by the New York Ministerium. He promptly set out to establish a new church. Along with friends Moore Castner, Daniel Sliker and Amos Smith, he undertook the construction of a fieldstone church on a half-acre ground on Anthony Road. The building of the church was an arduous task at that time, collecting stone and cutting wood, and was plastered both inside and out as was the fashion of the day. It was completed in the spring of 1844. The Mount Bethel church was immediately admitted to the Franckean Synod and was the only church in New Jersey listed in its register. It was first mentioned in the Synod minutes in June 1844.

Reverend Swackhammer and his family lived in a log cabin two or three hundred yards east of the church. He remained there only seven years and in 1850 accepted a call to the Lutheran Church in Bern, NY.

Moore Castner, who originally donated the land for the church, assumed possession of it after Reverend Swackhammer's departure. The church was used from 1844 until 1896 when it fell into disrepair.

Today the remaining stone walls of the church, as well as the cemetery, stand in ruins, overrun by poison ivy and a variety of trees. The Lebanon Township Historians erected a sign to designate the site.

For residential recycling, materials are accepted at each of the following locations:

1. The township recycling depots on the third Saturday of each month between 8:30 and 11:30 AM behind the Municipal Building.

2. The county residential recycling program at the Transfer Station in Annandale. The hours at the transfer station are 7:00 AM to 4:30 PM Monday through Friday and 7:00 AM to 1:00 PM on Saturday.

ITEMS ACCEPTED FOR RECYCLING:

• **Aluminum cans**: Only empty beverage cans will be accepted. Other aluminum items WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

• **Cardboard, chipboard & brown paper bags**: Corrugated, chipboard (boxboard) and brown paper bags will be accepted. Cardboard should be tied or placed in another cardboard container (box). Cardboard with food or food residue WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

• **Glass bottles and jars**: Food and beverage container glass with rings and caps removed will be accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed. Cups, drinking glasses, dishes, ovenware, window glass, lead crystal TV tubes, light bulbs, mirrors or any other type of glass product WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

• Hard covered books

• Junk mail & office paper: Un-shredded junk mail and office paper will be accepted. Junk mail and office paper should be tied or placed in a cardboard container (box). Shredded or bagged junk mail and office paper WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

• **Newspaper**: Newspaper tied with string or twine will be accepted. Newspaper bound in tape or other materials WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

• Paperback books

• **Plastics bottles # 1-7:** Plastic bottles # 1-7 that originally contained liquids are accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed.

• Telephone books

• **Tin and bi-metal cans:** Are accepted if all food and other residue has been removed. Labels do not have to be removed.

Electronics / Computer Recycling

A computer / electronics recycling event will be held on **Saturday, June 16** from 8:30 AM to 12:30 PM behind the Municipal Building at 530 West Hill Road.

Accepted items include cables, cell phones, computer monitors, copiers, CPUs, CRTs, DVD players, fax machines, keyboards, laptops, modems, old computers, printers, radios, scanners, stereo equipment, telephones, terminals, televisions, VCRs, and VHS players. Hard drives will be shredded at an Advance Recovery facility in Newark, NJ. No large appliances or items containing CFCs will be accepted.


