

Murder on the Musconetcong

Installment #1

by Nina Savoia, Historian Based on Murder along the Musconetcong: A tale of Jersey justice by Ruth Trask Farrow, 1973

Murder so brutal.

Spring in 1843 along the Musconetcong River was wet and cold. What with the wet weather and the spring thaw, Changewater, across the Musconetcong from New Hampton in Lebanon Township, contained its share of sinkholes and rough dirt roads.

On May 2, 1843, Stacy Bowlby was on his way from Port Colden to Changewater when he happened upon a large sinkhole at the bend in the road in Changewater. He discovered the body of a man lying face down in the sinkhole. Upon this discovery, he hurried to the nearest house, occupied by John Castner, but no one answered. He then ran to the mill at the bottom of the road and asked for assistance. The men from the mill joined Mr. Bowlby and hurried to help. When they turned the body over they realized it was John Castner! He had been horribly beaten about his head with fence posts that contained vestiges of his hair and blood. It was then they realized there must be something terribly wrong, for Castner lived with his wife, children and Mr. John B. Parke in the stone and frame house just near the road where his body was found; the house where Mr. Bowlby tried to arouse someone but no one had answered.

Mr. Franks, a foreman at the mill, gathered some of his men and approached the Parke/ Castner house. They found the front door unbarred, which was very unusual since Mr. Castner took many precautions against intruders. They entered the first floor kitchen, which served as the Castner bedroom, and found the bodies of Maria Parke Castner and her three year old daughter, Maria Matilda. Both were victims of brutal blows to their heads; their faces covered by pillows. The search party ventured upstairs to find the 17 year old farm boy, Jesse Force, leaning on his elbow with blood trickling from his head wound. He was incoherent and had not realized he'd been hurt. Mr. Franks hastily dispatched one of his men to summon Dr. McClenahan from New Hampton to attend to Jesse and examine the bodies.

In the meantime, they explored other sections of the house and found John B. Parke, the owner of the house, lying on his back with a pillow over his head. When the pillow was removed they found he had several head wounds. So savagely had he been attacked that a piece of his skull protruded behind his ear.

So, there on the night of May 1, 1843, 170 years ago, were the savage murders of John Castner, who had apparently scuffled with the intruder, and was dragged to the sinkhole in the road and beaten, his wife Maria Parke Castner, who was the younger sister of John B. Parke, Maria Matilda Castner, and John B. Parke, a wealthy bachelor who, it is told, would loan money to sundry and friends and hoarded money and gold in the house. Because of this, John Castner was in constant fear for his life and the lives of the people who lived in the house.

In addition to the four murdered family members, also residing in the house were Sally Parke, a spinster sister to John B. Parke, who served as his housekeeper, and the two Castner boys, Victor age 9, and John age 6, who were sleeping peacefully in a side room and had no knowledge of the brutal murders that surrounded them. Sally Parke was not in the house the night of the murders. She had traveled to the house of her sister, Rachel Parke Hulsizer, two miles away, to care for Rachel's son who was quite ill.

John B. Parke had two brothers, David and Abner Parke, who lived in New Hampton on the Lebanon Township side of the River. After the murders, David was given the task of representing his brother's estate, because the named executor, John Castner, was also deceased. David Parke was postmaster in New Hampton and a man of integrity. There was a \$1000 reward posted for information regarding the murders, with an additional \$300 posted by Governor William Pennington and \$500 posted by the Warren County Board of Freeholders. In 1843, few banks were solvent and in a locale suffering deep depression, a reward of \$1800 was considered too high by some. It was supposedly said by local Joe Carter, "they will hang an innocent man".

On Thursday, May 4, the funeral of the four murder victims was conducted at the Mansfield Cemetery in Washington. Because of the diatribe against the murderers by the Reverend Jacob Castner (no relation to John Castner), the ceremony took all day with hundreds of people attending, some travelling day and night to attend. Reverend Castner called upon the congregation to "Seek them out…as God will hold you personally responsible if you falter for one instant in your pursuit of those who have so basely shed innocent blood". The congregation eyed one another with suspicion, each hoping to secure the reward.

The ghostly looking head stones of the murder victims with their inflaming inscriptions, authored by the Reverend Castner, are still standing in that cemetery, as is the grave of the Reverend Castner.

Recycling News

Not only is recycling the right thing to do, it is also the law in New Jersey. Hunterdon County and Lebanon Township work together to try to make recycling convenient. Please check the recycling page of the Hunterdon County website, www.co.hunterdon.nj.us/ recycling.htm, for information about special county hazardous waste and



electronics recycling events. Lebanon Township generally has an electronics recycling event each spring.

For residential recycling, materials are accepted at each of the following locations:

1. The township recycling depot on the third Saturday of each month between 8:30 and 11:30 AM behind the Municipal Building.

2. The county residential recycling program at the Transfer Station in Annandale. The hours at the transfer station are 7:00 AM to 4:30 PM Monday through Friday and 7:00 AM to 1:00 PM on Saturday.

ITEMS ACCEPTED FOR RECYCLING:

• Aluminum cans: Only empty beverage cans will be accepted. Other aluminum items WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

• **Cardboard, chipboard & brown paper bags**: Corrugated, chipboard (boxboard) and brown paper bags will be accepted. Cardboard should be tied or placed in another cardboard container (box). Cardboard with food or food residue WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

• **Glass bottles and jars**: Food and beverage container glass with rings and caps removed will be accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed. Cups, drinking glasses, dishes, ovenware, window glass, lead crystal TV tubes, light bulbs, mirrors or any other type of glass product WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

• Hard covered books

• Junk mail & office paper: Un-shredded junk mail and office paper will be accepted. Junk mail and office paper should be tied or placed in a cardboard container (box). Shredded or bagged junk mail and office paper WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

• **Newspaper**: Newspaper tied with string or twine will be accepted. Newspaper bound in tape or other materials WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

• Paperback books


• **Plastics bottles # 1-7:** Plastic bottles # 1-7 that originally contained liquids are accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed.

• Telephone books

• **Tin and bi-metal cans:** Are accepted if all food and other residue have been removed. Labels do not have to be removed.
