


Litter Free Lebanon Township

News from the Police Department ...

- The Lebanon Township Police are conducting a Junior Police Academy in June. The academy is open to township boys and girls who have graduated 8th grade this year. - The Police Department has entered into an agreement with the Attorney General's office to participate in *Project Medicine Drop Program*. A prescription drug drop box will be maintained in the police department lobby. We anticipate the box being in place by the beginning of summer. More information will follow.
- Recent traffic surveys reveal there is a high volume of vehicular traffic traveling at unsafe speeds on many township roadways. To alleviate these unsafe conditions, the Lebanon Township Committee is in the process of imposing a 35 MPH speed limit resolution for all nonposted township roads which are not deemed residential.

Tree-killing Beetle is Spreading!

Since the printing of the last newsletter, the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB), which infests and kills ash trees, has been confirmed in Delaware Township, Hunterdon County and in Harmony Township, Warren County.

Almost all of the ash trees infested die within 3 to 4 years of initial infestation. The NJ Department of Agriculture estimated the EAB detected in Warren County was in the second year of infestation. Now is the time to identify any ash trees in your yard that may be a danger to people and/or property and look for signs of infestation.

Ash trees are fairly common in Lebanon Township. They have branches that grow opposite each other, a compound leaf with 5-11 leaflets and diamond-shaped bark.



1. Leaves are compound and composed of 5 to 11 leaflets.



2. Seeds on female trees are paddle shaped.



3. Branches and buds are in pairs directly across from each other (opposite branching).



4. Mature bark has diamond-shaped ridges.

Now that leaves are beginning to emerge, check the ash trees on your property for signs of infestation. You may have an infested tree is you see any of the following:

- a. The ash tree is still alive but has woodpeckers pecking on it
- b. The top branches of the ash tree is dead
- c. There are small D-shaped holes in the bark of the ash tree
- d. There are squiggly lines carved under the bark of the ash tree

- e. There is a large split in the bark of the ash tree
- f. The ash tree is sprouting new branches along the trunk or base of the tree
- g. You see a metallic green beetle about ½ inch long and shaped like a bullet

Please be proactive and report signs of the beetle to the NJ Department of Agriculture at (609) 406-6939.



Recycling

Recycling News

Not only is recycling the right thing to do, it is also the law in New Jersey. Hunterdon County and Lebanon Township work together to try to make recycling convenient. Please check the recycling page of the Hunterdon County website, www.co.hunterdon.nj.us/recycling.html, for information about special county hazardous waste and electronics recycling events.



For residential recycling, materials are accepted at each of the following locations:

- 1. The township recycling depot on the third Saturday of each month between 8:30 and 11:30 AM behind the Municipal Building.
- 2. The county residential recycling program at the Transfer Station in Annandale. The hours at the transfer station are 7:00 AM to 4:30 PM Monday through Friday and 7:00 AM to 1:00 PM on Saturday.

ITEMS ACCEPTED FOR RECYCLING:

- **Aluminum cans:** Only empty beverage cans will be accepted. Other aluminum items WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Cardboard, chipboard & brown paper bags: Corrugated, chipboard (boxboard) and brown paper bags will be accepted. Cardboard should be tied or placed in another cardboard container (box). Cardboard with food or food residue WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Glass bottles and jars: Food and beverage container glass with rings and caps removed will be accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed. Cups, drinking glasses, dishes, ovenware, window glass, lead crystal, TV tubes, light bulbs, mirrors or any other type of glass product WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Hard covered books
- Junk mail & office paper: Un-shredded junk mail and office paper will be accepted. Junk mail and office paper should be tied or placed in a cardboard container (box). Shredded or bagged junk mail and office paper WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- **Newspaper:** Newspaper tied with string or twine will be accepted. Newspaper bound in tape or other materials WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Paperback books
- Plastics bottles # 1-7: Plastic bottles # 1-7 that originally contained liquids are accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed.
- Telephone books
- Tin and bi-metal cans: Are accepted if all food and other residue have been removed. Labels do not have to be removed.



Historians

The Musconetcong River

The **Musconetcong River** is a 45.7-mile-long tributary of the Delaware River in northwestern New Jersey. It flows through the rural mountainous highlands country of northwestern New Jersey. Part of it is a registered National Wild and Scenic River.

The river rises out of Lake Hopatcong, on the border between Sussex and Morris counties. It flows through Lake Musconetcong, then flows southwest, past Hackettstown, Stephensburg, Changewater and New Hampton Historic District in Lebanon Township, then along the southeastern side of the Pohatcong Mountain ridge. It joins the Delaware River across from Riegelsville, Pennsylvania.

The river does not flow through any large population center and has been the site of relatively little industrial development throughout its history. Because the Musconetcong River corridor is located in a more remote part of New Jersey, much of the corridor's historical and archeological resources remain intact. Dozens of culturally significant historic and archeological resources, many of which are registered in the State and National Registers of Historic places, can be found along the 24.2 miles of the river's federal Wild and Scenic designation. In the 18th century, the surrounding hills were largely deforested as a source of charcoal for the iron industry in the surrounding region. The local industry declined by the middle of the 19th century after the building of the former Morris Canal, the course of which ran along the upper river, to bring coal from Pennsylvania to northern New Jersey. After the demise of the canal from the introduction of railroads in the late 19th century, the dam pools along the river that supplied the canal became the site of a popular summer cottage industry. Silted remnants of the pools, as well as the remnants of the canal itself, can still be seen along the river. Many historic stone and metal bridges span the river at various points.

Human habitation in the Musconetcong Valley can be traced back approximately 12,000 years to the end of the last ice age. The Plenge Site along the lower river in Warren County was the first of only two major Paleo-Indian archaeological site excavations in New Jersey, and is considered one of the most significant in the northeastern United States.

The Musconetcong River also offers exemplary natural resources, often referred to as the best trout fishery in New Jersey. Paddlers enjoy the river's rapid flows, and hikers' trek the miles of hilly trails that flank the river, affording stunning views of the river corridor. According to an urban legend, the river is also home to a creature known as the Musconetcong River Mantis Man, a somewhat humanoid, somewhat insect-like creature.
