

Spring has Finally Sprung, but so have the Weeds!

Finding a safe way to control weeds can be very frustrating. All manner of products or recipes can be found on the Internet that promise to wipe out plant intruders. It makes sense to use something that is effective, safe around our families and pets, and safe for the environment as well.

Some websites promote the use of a totally <u>natural</u> combination of vinegar, detergent and salt. Unfortunately what is natural and safe for people may not be healthy for other living things. Vinegar, for example, affects <u>any</u> plant by drying the leaves, so it needs to be used very carefully in a garden where you grow other plants. Detergents are poisonous to fish and make other animals very sick. Salt stays in soil for years, making it difficult to grow anything in it. It's best not to combine these ingredients; you can create new unknown chemicals that are potentially harmful.

If you are looking for an alternative to using herbicides, first learning something about the plant you want to control might help you pick the best method. If a weed has roots that break easily and form new plants, such as mugwort or knotweed, pulling the weed might actually make your problem worse if you can't remove all of the roots. Smothering the weeds with mulch can be affective if you leave it in place for a season. Lastly, for small weeds, pouring boiling water on them may work; you are actually cooking the plant to death. Just be careful not to burn yourself.

If you find yourself in over your head with larger plants growing where you don't want them, such as Japanese barberry, burning bush, or one of the invasive olives, hand pulling is the best method when feasible. A lot of places in our township, however, are inundated with invasive plants where there are too many or they are too big to pull. When faced with a task like this, you

may want to consider applying herbicides. When used carefully and according to manufacturer's directions, it can be very effective in controlling unwanted plants with little impact to the environment, but it does take planning.

- Determine the safest and most effective way to treat the unwanted plant. Pulling mugwort and Japanese knotweed will be a waste of time unless you get all parts of the roots out. Spraying herbicide on barberry in the early fall, after the berries are made and leaves turn yellow, will not be very effective, nor will spraying Japanese stiltgrass after it goes to seed.
- 2. Figure out how close you are to streams, rivers, and wetlands and keep an eye on the weather. Some herbicides and surfactants mixed with the herbicides are safe to apply in water, but most are not. Be sure there is no rain in the forecast when you are applying herbicide, or you risk it running off into your water.
- 3. Know the proper mixture of the herbicide for the method of application. Glyphosate is used to control grasses and woody plants, and either a mixture with 3% glyphosate can be sprayed directly onto the leaves of the plant, or you can cut the plant and paint the cut stump with a mixture of 50% glyphosate. Triclopyr is used to control broad-leafed plants while not affecting grasses or evergreens, and a 25% mixture can be painted or sprayed around the trunk of the plant from just above the soil to about 10-inches above the soil. Aminopyralid is very effective on thistle and mugwort when applying a 0.27% mixture directly onto the plant in the early summer or 4-8 weeks after mowing, but it should not be used in areas where livestock can graze.

The event, sponsored by the Environmental & Open Space Commission (EOSC), was the first to begin preparing the property, to be called Red Mill Race Preserve, for public enjoyment. Volunteers cleaned up litter across the 10-acre property and removed brush, rocks and small trees along a planned walking trail, which will be established in the old mill race and along the river. The Preserve is expected to be open to the public later this summer.

Recycling

Recycling News

Not only is recycling the right thing to do, it is also the law in New Jersey. Hunterdon County and Lebanon Township work together to try to make recycling convenient. Please check the recycling page of the Hunterdon County website, www.co.hunterdon.nj.us/recycling.html, for information about special county hazardous waste and electronics recycling events.



For residential recycling, materials are accepted at each of the following locations:

- 1. The township recycling depot on the third Saturday of each month between 8:30 and 11:30 AM behind the Municipal Building.
- 2. The county residential recycling program at the Transfer Station in Annandale. The hours at the transfer station are 7:00 AM to 4:30 PM Monday through Friday and 7:00 AM to 1:00 PM on Saturday.

ITEMS ACCEPTED FOR RECYCLING:

- **Aluminum cans:** Only empty beverage cans will be accepted. Other aluminum items WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Cardboard, chipboard & brown paper bags: Corrugated, chipboard (boxboard) and brown paper bags will be accepted. Cardboard should be tied or placed in another cardboard container (box). Cardboard with food or food residue WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Glass bottles and jars: Food and beverage container glass with rings and caps removed will be accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed. Cups, drinking glasses, dishes, ovenware, window glass, lead crystal, TV tubes, light bulbs, mirrors or any other type of glass product WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Hard covered books
- Junk mail & office paper: Un-shredded junk mail and office paper will be accepted. Junk mail and office paper should be tied or placed in a cardboard container (box). Shredded or bagged junk mail and office paper WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- **Newspaper:** Newspaper tied with string or twine will be accepted. Newspaper bound in tape or other materials WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Paperback books
- Plastics bottles # 1-7: Plastic bottles # 1-7 that originally contained liquids are accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed.
- Telephone books
- **Tin and bi-metal cans:** Are accepted if all food and other residue have been removed. Labels do not have to be removed.





Bureau Drawer - Glen Gardner's First Commissioned Post Office March 20, 1830

This is the story of Glen Gardner's first Post Office, from the *Hunterdon Republican*, reprinted from the *Newark News*, contributed by Ruth Otey. Up to 1919, Glen Gardner was part of Lebanon Township.

How a bureau drawer served as a post office in the early days of Glen Gardner, when it was still known as Spruce Run, was told Sunday, August 3, 1919, by Mrs. Martha Cowell, during the celebration of her eighty-eighth birthday, which was held at the home of her son, Councilman Calvin Cowell, in Glen Gardner.

Mrs. Cowell was born there and has lived there during her entire lifetime. When she was still a small child, she related, the grandfather of Dr. T. Edgar Hunt, (William A. Hunt) who was also a physician, was appointed postmaster of Spruce Run. The law required that the office be located along the turnpike (Spruce Run Turnpike), so that mail could be left and collected by the stage coach without it leaving the main road.

No suitable building was available and the new postmaster was in a quandary. He consulted Mrs. Cowell's father, John Baker, who resided on the turnpike, and Mr. Baker offered the use of a bureau drawer in his home for the post office.

So the town got its first post office. When the coach driver neared the Baker home, he would blow his horn and the mail would be brought out to him. The mail he handed over for Spruce Run would be placed in the bureau drawer, and there it was available for inspection by any resident of Spruce Run, who came in, looked it over, took what belonged to him and left the rest.



Home Fire Safety

Home fire safety means keeping your family and home safe from the devastations of fire. Home fire safety should always be a top priority and is almost entirely about prevention. A little bit of prevention can go a long way. There are very simple steps you can take to promote fire safety in your home:

- Make sure there are working smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors in all bedroom areas.
- Keep your valuables in a fire-proof safe.
- Keep flammable and dangerous items out of the reach of children.
- Create a fire evacuation plan and practice it with the entire family, including children.
- Make sure all exits are easily accessible debris, garbage and other obstacles can prevent people from getting out and prevent rescue workers and fire fighters from getting in.
- Make sure your children have a clear understanding of what to do in case of a fire and what to do if their clothes or hair catch on fire.
- Make sure all smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors have fresh batteries.
- If your carbon monoxide detectors are more than six years old, REPLACE THEM!
- Can we find you? Post house numbers next to your driveway!
- Keep driveways clear and wide enough for emergency vehicles.

Home fire safety is an easy thing to promote. It only takes some simple, common-sense precautions, fresh batteries, and a clear plan.

Outdoor Fire Safety Tips: July is the Peak Month for Grill Fires

Propane and charcoal barbeque grills must only be used outdoors. If used indoors, or in any enclosed spaces such as tents, they pose a fire hazard and a risk of exposing occupants to deadly carbon monoxide poisoning.

- Place the grill a safe distance from lawn games, play areas and foot traffic. Grills should be positioned at least ten feet away from siding, deck railing and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep matches, lighters and starter fluid out of the reach of children in a locked drawer or cabinet.
- Keep children and pets away from the grill area: declare a three-foot "kid-free zone" around the grill.
- Use long barbeque mitts and long-handled grilling tools to protect the chef from heat and flames when cooking.
- Periodically remove grease or fat buildup in trays below the grill so it cannot be ignited by a hot grill.


