

Easter Egg Hunt Delights Lebanon Township Kids

The weather held up on Sunday, April 14 for the annual Easter Egg Hunt sponsored by the Recreation Commission. This tradition has been a staple springtime event for many decades. Two years ago the Recreation Commission collaborated with the Lebanon Township Environmental Commission to come up with a more sustainable way to host our



annual Easter Egg hunt. Instead of purchasing the traditional plastic eggs, we found a company that developed a more eco-friendly option. The Eco Eggs are made from plants, 100% renewable content (versus petroleum based plastic) and are fully compostable after use. They are made from non-toxic, durable, plant based plastic. The Commission also "recycles" and collects the eggs year after year and volunteers refill them with treats and prizes prior to the event. With one simple switch, we were able to be more mindful of what we consume while still creating a joyful, fun and "eggciting" experience for our kids! This year hundreds of children enjoyed the mad dash to collect as



many eggs as they could. Older children participated in a nature scavenger hunt, fanning out throughout the park. Afterwards, the playground was full of life and the sound of happy little ones laughing and enjoying the company of one another. Tick Time!

As you roam about the woods this summer, hopefully wearing long pants and a shirt sprayed with permethrin to keep the deer ticks at bay, keep an eye out for a tick that looks like a smaller, plain-looking version of a dog tick - it may be the newlyarrived Asian longhorned tick. Its United States debut was in Hunterdon County and it has since been identified throughout Central New Jersey and other states infesting livestock, pets, wildlife, and people.

Because this tick does not need a mate to reproduce, one individual can create a population of ticks that can eventually infest a single animal with so many ticks the animal could die from blood loss. The good news is, while these ticks are known to carry a multitude of tick-borne diseases in other countries, none of the tick samples collected in the United States have tested positive for any disease. They also don't carry Lyme disease.

If you find one of these ticks, or find an animal covered in ticks, place a tick in a sealable (i.e. Ziploc) sandwich bag, confirm the ID at https://www.nj.gov/agriculture/divisions/ah/, and report it to 1-833-NEW-TICK.

The Lebanon Township Museum staff is extremely honored to be hosting *The Stars* and Stripes: Fabric of the American SpiritTM



from June 13 to July 13. This exclusive exhibit will be on loan from the collection of renowned Author and Historian J. Richard Pierce.

This exhibit traces the evolution of the American flag and brings to life the personal and historical accounts that speak to the character of our nation. From 1777 until 1912, no laws were enacted governing the arrangement of stars on the flag. This resulted in varying designs and configuration of stars which reflect the spirit of a changing American symbol that emerged over the course of our history.

The exhibition includes flags with handwritten inscriptions and stamped overprints, as well as many found with personal letters and notes. Relating these stories through the prism of the American flag is what makes the exhibit such an impressive repository of the American experience.

Thursday, June 13 - Exhibit Opening Reception including light refreshments and a lecture by the Collector entitled *Evolution of the American Flag.* J. Richard Pierce will lead us on a journey from June 14, 1777 (now celebrated as Flag Day) when the Continental Congress passed the Flag Act through the years to our current 13 stripe, 50 star flag which has served under 12 Presidents and is now the oldest flag in our Nation's history. Reception begins at 6:00 pm; lecture begins at 7:00 pm.

Saturday, June 15 from 1:00 pm - Community Flag Day Celebration! Visit the exhibit inside the Museum while outside in the yard, we celebrate the 70th Anniversary of President Truman designating June 14 as National Flag Day.

<u>A Spy in Our Midst?</u> David Overaker, Historian

An American Communist Party member and soviet spy, who later turned and became the US government's principal witness in the investigation of Alger Hiss for espionage in 1948-1950, lived briefly with his wife Esther in a barn right here in Lebanon Township.

The year was 1932. Whittaker Chambers was working in New York City as editor of *The New Masses* magazine, a literary monthly published by the American Communist Party. In June he was summoned to a private meeting with a Comrade Bedacht, member of the Central Committee of the Communist Party and head of the International Workers Order, a Communist fraternal benefit society. Unbeknownst to Whittaker at the time, Max Bedacht was also the Party's secret link with Soviet military intelligence. Bedacht wanted Whittaker to do "underground work"; acceptance would require leaving *The New Masses* and leaving the "open" Communist Party. An answer was required by the following morning. Whittaker recounts taking the train home that evening in his bestselling autobiography "Witness" (Chapter 5 "Underground - The First Apparatus"):

Home was then a wild lonely farm, six miles from Glen Gardner, in Hunterdon County, in western New Jersey. My wife and I had moved there early in the cold spring of 1932. The move was more like a flight than a move. [...]

At that point, two friends, two left-wing intellectuals, who owned a farm near Glen Gardner, proposed that my wife and I should go out and remodel their barn as a house, where we could then live rent free¹.

Whittaker's friends were Franklin and Delafied (Della) Day Spier. Franklin Spier was founder of a New York City firm specializing in advertising for book publishers; he and Della were well known figures in Manhattan's vibrant bohemian community of Marxist intellectuals². The Spiers purchased the farm at 40 Red Mill Road in 1930 with the home and barn in a state of disrepair. They owned the property until 1939 and made some key renovations which are chronicled in photographs that remain with the house today.

The barn had not been used for years. It was weathered, windowless, drafty, but its frame was solid. It stood between a dirt road, where few cars passed, and a little brook, which could not be seen under its ferns. Behind rose a densely wooded mountainside³. My wife and I had almost no money. We did not care. We set to work to lay floors out of old lumber and to raise walls of field stone. In our spare time we planted gardens. Few periods of our life have been so happy. All around us, in the earliest spring, the benzoin⁴ bushes put out their little yellow flowers on bare branches and filled the air with searching sweetness. Behind us, the brook gurgled, and all day the thrushes filled the mountainside with their flutings.⁵

Sometimes, at sundown, we would walk to the edge of a hill from which we could see out across a valley, its farms and a village. One evening we reached the rim of the lookout, and the village with its white-spired church lay toylike and suntouched below us. It had rained. The air was a pure ocean. Suddenly, there floated up to us through it from far below, the voices of hundreds of robins chanting together. The sound, floating in the air, seemed to have no connection with the earth, so that we stood silently side by side, listening to it, until the sun set and even the height where we stood grew dark. [...]

Glen Gardner was too far from New York for me to

commute every day, and ... I usually stayed [with] Communist friends, My wife ... spent the days in endless activity and one of the joys of homecoming was to see how much she had accomplished in the barn and the gardens while I was gone. [...] I would take the short cut across the mountain and walk the six miles to the station⁶. This walk appalled our friends. But like our other hardships, we regarded it as something that a Communist takes in his stride.

My wife used to walk part of the way with me. The short cut ran through a great apple orchard that in April was heavy with bloom and humming with bees. Sometimes, as we climbed through the woods, deer, that we had not seen until they broke before us, would swim across fallen trees, and blend with the shadows and the stillness.

On arriving home that night, Whittaker told his wife about the decision before him. While he wasn't sure what "underground work" meant, he felt a sense of duty to the cause. His wife pleaded with him not to accept the offer.

The next morning Whittaker reluctantly declined the offer, but was given no choice but to accept; thus started a six year life of aliases, covert operations, and shadowy meetings within a web of interconnected underground cells in New York City and Washington DC whose activities were directed at providing intelligence to the Soviets and placing covert communists into various strategic offices of the US Government to advance policy. Following instructions to rent an apartment in New York City, Whittaker and Esther sadly abandoned their beloved barn leaving only their furniture behind.

By 1938, Whittaker's faith in communism was waning. He was disturbed by Stalin's Great Purge in the Soviet Union and became fearful for his own life as disillusioned fellow spies had mysteriously died or disappeared. He deserted and went into hiding, taking a package of source documents to use as a "life preserver" if the Soviets came after him. With the pact of neutrality between Nazi Germany and the Soviet Union in 1939, Whittaker turned anti-communist and revealed a list of current and former federal government employees as spies to the Assistant Secretary of State. He came out of hiding to join the staff of Time magazine and soon rose through the 1940's to



become senior editor. Meanwhile, both the FBI and the House Un-American Activities Committee (HUAC) were conducting investigations of subversive communist activities and soviet espionage.


When Whittaker was called to testify before HUAC in 1948, he named Alger Hiss as a member of the underground communist "Ware Group" while working at the State Department in the 1930's. When pressed for evidence, he provided the documents he had hidden inside a pumpkin on his Maryland farm. The "Pumpkin Papers" included microfilm images of State Department materials, including notes in Hiss' own handwriting. Alger Hiss was found guilty of perjury for falsely testifying to a grand jury that he had never given documents to Whittaker Chambers. The evidence confirmed that Alger Hiss had engaged in espionage, but he could not be indicted on that charge since the statute of limitations had run out.

Published in 1952, "Witness" was both autobiography and an analysis of the communist ideology and the threat it posed to America. Soon afterwards, Whittaker took a job as senior editor at the National Review until 1959. He died in 1961.

President Ronald Reagan posthumously awarded Chambers the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1984 for his contribution to "the century's epic struggle between freedom and totalitarianism".

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Recycling

Recycling News

Not only is recycling the right thing to do, it is also the law in New Jersey. Hunterdon County and Lebanon Township work together to try to make recycling convenient. Please check the recycling page of the Hunterdon County website, www.co.hunterdon.nj.us/ recycling.html, for information about special county hazardous waste and electronics recycling events.



For residential recycling, materials are accepted at each of the following locations:

1. The township recycling depot on the third Saturday of each month between 8:30 and 11:30 AM behind the Municipal Building.

2. The county residential recycling program at the Transfer Station in Annandale. The hours at the transfer station are 7:00 AM to 4:30 PM Monday through Friday and 7:00 AM to 1:00 PM on Saturday.

ITEMS ACCEPTED FOR RECYCLING:

• Aluminum cans: Only empty beverage cans will be accepted. Other aluminum items WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

• **Cardboard, chipboard & brown paper bags:** Corrugated, chipboard (boxboard) and brown paper bags will be accepted. Cardboard should be tied or placed in another cardboard container (box). Cardboard with food or food residue WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

• **Glass bottles and jars:** Food and beverage container glass with rings and caps removed will be accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed. Cups, drinking glasses, dishes, ovenware, window glass, lead crystal, TV tubes, light bulbs, mirrors or any other type of glass product WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

Hard covered books

• Junk mail & office paper: Un-shredded junk mail and office paper will be accepted. Junk mail and office paper should be tied or placed in a cardboard container (box). Shredded or bagged junk mail and office paper WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

• **Newspaper:** Newspaper tied with string or twine will be accepted. Newspaper bound in tape or other materials WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

Paperback books

• **Plastics bottles # 1-7:** Plastic bottles # 1-7 that originally contained liquids are accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed.

• Telephone books

• **Tin and bi-metal cans:** Are accepted if all food and other residue have been removed. Labels do not have to be removed.
