

- 2. From Point Mountain or Route 31, take Musconetcong River Road (Route 645) to Hollow Road. At the top of the hill, turn right onto Anthony Road. Watch for signs; the Fire House will be on the left.
- From the Municipal Building or Hill Road, follow Red Mill Road to Newport Road. Make a right onto Newport and follow to the end (just past the Road Department Building). Turn left onto Anthony Road. Watch for signs; the Fire House will be on the left.

Preparing for Winter Emergencies

Lebanon Township has already had its first winter storm, Tuesday, October 28. The storm shut down most of the power and roads in the township. It also left emergency workers scrambling to answer an unprecedented number of calls from residents and mutual aid calls. Here are a few helpful hints to keep you safe for the winter.

During the winter, the most likely emergency is for the electricity to go out. Prepare for this by finding an alternative way to heat your home. An alternative heat source is important not just for the people living in the house, but also because bursting frozen water pipes can create a major disaster. If possible, have a backup generator available to run the heating system for short bursts during the day to keep interior temps above freezing. If you have a wood stove or a fireplace, keep quantities of wood standing by, just in case. If you have a gas log fireplace, it should operate even without electricity as usually the gas will continue to flow. Try to control fuel usage, by closing off unnecessary rooms and dressing warmly.

We do not recommend kerosene heaters because of the danger they pose. However if you chose this alternative method of heating, have carbon-monoxide detectors in operation and keep fire-extinguishers handy. More importantly, do NOT bring a charcoal or gas grill inside as the fumes can kill.

Keep battery operated or wind-up flashlights and radios ready. It is a great way to stay informed of weather conditions and also to keep a ready source of light on hand. Having a store of food and drink that does not need electricity to stay preserved is also a good idea. Enough preserved foods (dried fruits, canned goods, crackers, cookies, etc.) to last several days should do the trick. Keep a 5 gallon container of water in your basement or pantry, or at least a case of bottled water. You can also use snow, but it should be boiled for one minute before use.

A first-aid kit should also be on your list of items necessary to prepare for an emergency. We encourage you to take a CPR/First Aid course so that you have the know-how to deal with minor emergencies and know when to call 911. It is especially important to not abuse the emergency system during a township-wide emergency. Before dialing, ask yourself if this is truly an emergency call or if you can wait to see your family doctor. If you are suffering from shortness of breath, chest pain or the person you are with has an altered mental status, please call 911. Do not attempt to drive yourself or a loved one to the hospital. There is no rescue method that allows you to drive and do CPR at the same time.

More importantly, if you are dependent on medication or oxygen, make sure you have an adequate supply to last you for several days. This is especially important for our many residents who have machines at home that convert room air to oxygen. When the power goes out, you will lose your oxygen supply. Make sure

you have spare canisters of oxygen to use in case this happens.

Winter and the driving risks associated with the season have just begun. The October 28 storm just gave us a taste of what can happen on the road. The National Weather Service reports that 70 percent of injuries due to snow and ice result from vehicle accidents. When a winter storm hits, consider staying home. Before leaving the house ask yourself, "Is this journey worth my life?" If the answer is no, stay home.

Winterize your car by taking it to a trusted mechanic, who will check the tires for appropriate pressure and tread, the cooling system, the battery, the wiper blades and washer fluid, etc. Keep extra blankets in the trunk in the event you are stranded and have to wait for help. Keep your gas tank near full to avoid ice in the tank and fuel lines. Before hitting the road, make sure you and all passengers have a warm coat, hat, gloves or mittens and water resistant boots. It is best to dress in several lighter layers of clothing as opposed to one large outer layer.

Consider creating a disaster kit in your car that includes battery-powered NOAA radio with extra batteries, blanket and/or sleeping bags, first aid kit and manual, flashlight with extra batteries, fire extinguisher (5 lb., A-B-C type), battery booster cables and flares, tire repair kit and pump, compass, road map, knife, heavy sack of sand or cat litter (for tire traction) and tow rope, bottled water and non-perishable, high-energy foods such as peanut butter and granola bars, extra clothing to keep dry, and windshield scraper and brush.

When traveling in bad weather, take it slow and inform someone of your route, destination and estimated arrival time. Remember that a trip does not have to be a long one to pose a risk in bad weather. Wherever you are going, avoid driving alone if possible.

As we go into the winter months, use common sense when emergencies happen. Remember, staying calm is the first part of responding to any emergency. The members of the Lebanon Township First Aid Squad hope that you have a safe and happy winter.

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Recycling

Township Depot Continues

The Township Recycling Depot is held on the third Saturday of each month from 8:30 AM to 11:30 AM behind the First Aid Squad and Municipal Buildings, 530 West Hill Road. Containers (aluminum, bi-metal, glass, and #1 and #2 plastics) can be commingled. Cardboard, newspapers and junk mail/magazines should be bundled and tied separately. Household batteries can also be dropped off. Please observe the rules - we're getting a lot of plastic that is not #1 or #2.

Items Now Being Accepted Recycling at the Hunterdon **County Transfer Station/Recycling Depot**

The list of items now being accepted for recycling at the Hunterdon County Transfer Station/Recycling Depot has been expanded. The complete list is below. The Recycling Depot, located at 10 Petticoat Lane in Annandale, is open Monday through Friday from 7:00 AM - 4:30 PM and Saturday from 7:00 AM - 1:00 PM.

Items accepted for recycling are:

- Aluminum cans Only empty beverage cans will be accepted. Other aluminum items WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Cardboard, chipboard & brown paper bags Corrugated, chipboard (boxboard) and brown paper bags will be accepted. Cardboard should be tied or placed in another cardboard container (box). Cardboard with food or food residue WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- 3. Glass bottles and jars Food and beverage container glass with rings and caps removed will be accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed. Cups, drinking glasses, dishes, ovenware, window glass, lead crystal TV tubes, light bulbs, mirrors or any other type of glass product WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Hard covered books
- Junk mail & office paper Unshredded junk mail and office paper will be accepted. Junk mail and office paper should be tied or placed in a cardboard container (box). Shredded or bagged junk mail and office paper WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- 6. Newspaper Newspaper tied with string or twine will be accepted. Newspaper bound in tape or other materials WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- 7. Paperback books
- Plastics bottles # 1-7 Plastic bottles # 1-7 that originally contained liquids are accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed.
- Telephone books
- 10. Tin and bi-metal cans Are accepted if all food and other residue has been removed. Labels do not have to be removed.
- 11. Dry cell batteries

From a modest start of 150 children in the initial soccer program, the program has grown to include almost 1000 children in soccer, basketball, T-Ball, softball and baseball.

LTAA is an independent, non-profit, self-supporting organization, composed of parents of participating children as well as volunteers from the community. All funding comes primarily from the registration fees paid by the participants, as well as, occasional, volunteer fund-raising activities.

LTAA programs are designed with a focus on the individual. We stress that each individual should be involved in a positive environment that helps that individual grow. A Look back at our Heritage ... By Ralph Lomerson Lebanon Township Historian

CAMP WO-CHI-CA

A Children's Camp Located on Pleasant Grove Road Lebanon Township, 1934-1950

Along about 1933, a group of workers set up a camp for their children as part of an adult camp at Wingdale, New York. Things were pretty cramped there and it was difficult to have freedom for youngsters when they had to share baseball, swimming, etc., with grownups. So the workers who directed the camp decided to look for a new place for their camp.

Some people told these workers about a farm up in the mountains of Lebanon Township, some sixty odd miles from New York City. They found a 127 acre abandoned and run down farm, owned by the Lance family. The owners loaned the farm to the workers for three years, after which, the workers would have to buy the farm. Organizations like the Fur Workers Union, Painters Unions, International Workers Union & the Progressive Women's Council gave money and support to build the camp. Since this happened in the middle of the Depression, it was very hard for people to give away their money.

What they found when they came was only an old beat up house, plastered white on the outside, another dirty old building which was used as a mess hall, an old red barn and some chicken coops. There were a few tumbled down shacks used for storing equipment, and that was about the whole deal. But money began coming in, whole armies of workers - just plain people - folks from the neighborhood of New York, came up to camp in the winter and spring of 1935. They didn't get paid for their work. They wanted to help build a workers children's camp. They put in long hours building and preparing, opening in the summer of 1935. It was called "WO-CHI-CA", which stood for Workers Children's Camp.

This is how they developed the camp. The main thing that had to be built was the water tower. It was needed to pump water up from the well at the camp entrance. Over on the campus, they built tent platforms and four bunks and the toilets and washrooms. From that year on, the camp was built up little by little. Tents were pitched, fields were cleared, the chicken coops were converted into activity shacks with rooms built upstairs for staff members to sleep in. Campers came up from the first year and pitched in and helped to build the camp. It was a wonderful experience to see that farm converted from a rest home for a few broken down chickens and a tired old cow, into a community for children. A cement worker came one year and built stone water fountains. A modern incinerator was built for the burning of all garbage. The entire mess hall was rebuilt and knotty pine walls

made it a delight to the eye. Then, hand hewn tables of sturdy oak were built for it. Benches, tables, cabinets were turned out with skilled hands. On July 28, 1948 the "Paul Robeson Playhouse" was dedicated.

Because all the parents at WO-CHI-CA were either members of the Socialist Workers Party or in a Workers Union, the townspeople did not like having the camp in their township. They were afraid of communism and made life hard for the people at the camp. It is assumed this is the reason WO-CHI-CA did not open in 1950, or ever again. Stories around town tell how the townspeople burned the workers out of WO-CHI-CA, but this is an unfounded rumor. The camp moved to a sister camp located in the State of Connecticut.

In 1950-51, a man who owned a packaging company, bought the land that was WO-CHI-CA. His name was Henry Beisler. Between 1951 and 1953, he turned the land over to the Lutheran Church of New Jersey. WO-CHI-CA became known as Camp Beisler and opened in the summer of 1953. Thirteen of the original buildings were used, including the Paul Robeson Playhouse, now known as the Rec. Hall. In 1970, the Army Core of Engineers designed a 7 1/2 acre lake to be dug out of the old swimming hole. It was known as Beisler Lake. The camp used it for swimming lessons, free swimming, boating and canoeing.

The camp is still operating as part of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America's Synod of New Jersey.


