Historians

Woodglen Village

Excerpts taken from <u>Lebanon Township 200 Years</u> by Nina Savoia

Woodglen Village was settled around 1756 by about a dozen families. Around 1800, after a local tavern owner noticed his building was becoming shabby looking and had it painted white, the area became known as White Hall. The village included a stage coach stop, general store, wheelwright, blacksmith shop, and a school, as well as residents' homes.

The most famous enterprise of Woodglen Village was the gold mine started around 1900 and said to be located near the present school grounds. Of course, there are many conflicting stories about this. Around this time, to avoid conflicts with mail being routed to another White Hall in New Jersey, the village's name was changed to Woodglen.

News from the Library ...



Pancake Breakfast



Recycling

Recycling News

Not only is recycling the right thing to do, it is also the law in New Jersey. Hunterdon County and Lebanon Township work together to try to make recycling convenient. Please check the recycling page of the Hunterdon County website, www.co.hunterdon.nj.us/recycling.htm, for information about special county hazardous waste and



electronics recycling events. Lebanon Township generally has an electronics recycling event each spring.

For residential recycling, materials are accepted at each of the following locations:

- 1. The township recycling depot on the third Saturday of each month between 8:30 and 11:30 AM behind the Municipal Building.
- 2. The county residential recycling program at the Transfer Station in Annandale. The hours at the transfer station are 7:00 AM to 4:30 PM Monday through Friday and 7:00 AM to 1:00 PM on Saturday.

ITEMS ACCEPTED FOR RECYCLING:

- **Aluminum cans**: Only empty beverage cans will be accepted. Other aluminum items WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Cardboard, chipboard & brown paper bags: Corrugated, chipboard (boxboard) and brown paper bags will be accepted. Cardboard should be tied or placed in another cardboard container (box). Cardboard with food or food residue WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Glass bottles and jars: Food and beverage container glass with rings and caps removed will be accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed. Cups, drinking glasses, dishes, ovenware, window glass, lead crystal TV tubes, light bulbs, mirrors or any other type of glass product WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Hard covered books
- **Junk mail & office paper**: Un-shredded junk mail and office paper will be accepted. Junk mail and office paper should be tied or placed in a cardboard container (box). Shredded or bagged junk mail and office paper WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- **Newspaper**: Newspaper tied with string or twine will be accepted. Newspaper bound in tape or other materials WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- Paperback books
- **Plastics bottles # 1-7:** Plastic bottles # 1-7 that originally contained liquids are accepted. All containers MUST be emptied and rinsed.
- Telephone books
- **Tin and bi-metal cans:** Are accepted if all food and other residue has been removed. Labels do not have to be removed.

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

News from North Hunterdon-Voorhees Regional High School

- The district is proud to report that both North Hunterdon and Voorhees High Schools were listed among the Highest Performing Schools in the state this year by the New Jersey Department of Education as part of its new accountability system. This designation was based on school-wide proficiency on standardized tests and graduation rates. North Hunterdon and Voorhees High Schools were the only schools in Hunterdon County included on the list, and only 69 out of 2,500 total schools in the state were recognized as Highest Performing.

Hurricane Sandy Unites Township Residents

Most of us will not forget Hurricane Sandy for a very long time. Although our memories of this storm and its effect on our township will be varied, there will be some most of us share ... trees down; power, phone and cable lines down; roads closed; no lights, no heat, no water, no internet, no school; gas lines and odd/even days; searching for fresh food, ATM machines, generators and gas to power them; Halloween activities postponed or canceled. And then there are the memories of the effects of this storm on communities nearby ... loss of life, loss of homes and property, and the destruction seen at the Jersey Shore, in Hoboken, Jersey City and lower Manhattan, on Staten Island and Long Island. The list goes on. Those are the bad memories, and there are probably many more for some of us.

But here in Lebanon Township, many of us will also have memories of the spirit of community that arose from this storm. Neighbors helped neighbors, sharing their homes, heat, food, hot water, and generators; collections of food and clothing began; a local church opened its doors to provide warmth, hot showers, coffee, and internet access; linesmen from states as far away as Michigan and Georgia worked tirelessly to restore our power. Again, the list goes on.

Throughout the days and weeks following the storm, nowhere was the spirit of community more evident in our township than at a Potluck meal held on Sunday, November 11, at Woodglen School. The Potluck was organized in less than 72 hours by a group of township residents, mainly through the Lebanon Township Community Facebook page.

Local residents who were still without power were invited to come and enjoy an afternoon of fellowship and good food, provided by their neighbors, local restaurants and businesses. School Superintendent Jason Kornegay and Woodglen Principal Mike Rubright supervised kids in the gym while their parents enjoyed a warm, home cooked meal in the cafeteria, for many, the first they had had in quite a while. An abundance of soups, stews, casseroles, pasta dishes, salads, desserts and more were donated, and leftovers, of which there were many, were taken out to linesmen working on power lines throughout the

St. John Neumann Welcomes New Pastor

The Community of St. John Neumann in Lebanon Township has welcomed a new pastor, the Rev. Abraham Orapankal. "Father Abraham" assumed his new responsibility in September, succeeding the founding pastor, the Very Rev. J. William Mickiewicz, "Father Bill", who



has retired after 30 years. His ministry has included serving as a high school principal, church pastor and adjunct professor of theology in India.

Father Abraham's primary task for his new assignment is to continue the mission of the Catholic Community of St. John Neumann: to be living witnesses of Jesus Christ. The weekly motivation and sustenance for this witnessing comes from the community's Sunday worship. He believes that "the Sunday service must be the time when the worshippers feel they are touched by God. Hence, it must be a prayerful, meaningful and happy experience so that everyone will spontaneously want to come back every Sunday." He said he is fully aware and appreciative of the fact that St. John's initially was nourished by the hospitality of Califon Christian communities - in particular, Califon United Methodist Church and Lower Valley Presbyterian Church. "I have worked for many years as a missionary in Nagaland (in the northeast of India) which is predominantly a Baptist region, and so I am at home in the midst of various Christian communities and I look forward to working together with the different communities around here," he said about his appointment here. He enjoys reading and walking.

Born Oct. 11, 1956 in Kerala, India, Father Abraham, has four younger brothers and three younger sisters. At age 15, he entered the seminary in Assam, India to become a missionary priest. He graduated from Christ King College in Shillong and completed his theological studies at the Papal Seminar in Pune. He was ordained to the priesthood on Dec. 17, 1983 for the missionary Diocese of Kohima in Nagaland, then earned his master's degree in theology. He was appointed dean of the Minor Seminary in Nagaland, where he subsequently became rector.

Father Abraham came to the United States in 1994 and ministered at various N.Y. area churches while studying at Fordham University and the Shalem Institute of Spiritual Direction in Bethesda, Md. He returned to India in 2001 to teach theology and to serve as spiritual director at Oriens Theological Seminary in Shillong. In 2004 he returned to the U.S. and began six years' ministry with Renew International, based in Plainfield, as a national presenter and retreat director. He also supervised Renew's "Theology on Tap" program which reaches out to young adults.

Father Abraham came to Hunterdon County from St. Bartholomew Church in East Brunswick where he was parochial vicar for the past two years. He is known for bringing the word of God to life and relating it to today's culture.

United Way of Hunterdon County Looking for Volunteers for Tax Season

Looking for a different kind of volunteer opportunity? How about volunteering to assist with tax return preparation for low-to-moderate income Hunterdon County area residents this tax season? Last year our tax preparation volunteers returned \$423,968 to Hunterdon County residents!

United Way of Hunterdon County is looking for volunteers to spend a little time learning about tax return preparation. You will be trained with Internal Revenue Service tax materials to help people whose incomes are under \$51,000 with their federal and state individual income tax returns.

Through the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program (VITA), you will learn to prepare simple federal and state tax returns. In return, you will be asked to donate about four hours a week helping at a VITA site from the beginning of February through April 15th. Our VITA sites transmit tax returns electronically. If you're interested in learning to *e*-file tax returns on a volunteer basis, then VITA can teach you.

You need not have any accounting experience. All that's required is a desire to help others who cannot prepare their basic tax returns or afford to pay a preparer. VITA volunteers participate in training sessions—in class, online, or through self-study—then are tested on what they have learned. Once certified, volunteers are assigned to VITA sites in neighborhood community centers, libraries, and churches in locations convenient to VITA customers.

Not interested in numbers, but still looking to help people? Consider volunteering as a Greeter at a free tax preparation site in Hunterdon County. Volunteer Greeters assist tax preparation clients as they fill out paperwork, ensure clients have brought in all of the paperwork needed to complete a tax return, make reminder phone calls to clients, and provide clients with additional resources they can access once their return has been completed.


